Sixth Form Code of Conduct

SIXTH FORM CONTRACT

All Sixth Form students are expected to adhere to this contract during their time at Eastbrook School.

ACADEMIC EXPECTATIONS

- Students are responsible for all books and equipment issued to them, which must be returned to the teaching staff and in good condition.
- Students must present themselves on time to each lesson, well prepared with the correct books and equipment ready to make a worthwhile and valuable contribution.
- Students must ensure all homework is completed on time and all coursework deadlines met.

EXAMINATIONS ENTRY

- All students deemed to be ready for examination, including BTEC and CTEC will be paid for by the school. If Academic staff are concerned about a student's performance or absence record, they may not enter them for exam, but if the student wishes to enter themselves, they will have to cover the costs.
- Students who fail to meet any of the Sixth Form Code of Conduct criteria, fail to complete work
 to an acceptable standard, along with poor attendance and punctuality will be removed from the
 course. They will be expected to refund examination entry costs or BTEC/CTEC registration costs.
- If a student decides to drop a subject or leave school after exam entries have been made the student will be liable for costs incurred.
- Any student absent from an exam without adequate medical evidence will be liable for the cost of entry. Current costs as follows:
- Level 3 BTEC Subsidiary Diploma and Level 3 BTEC Extended Diploma £164.00.

MISCONDUCT

Good attendance, adherence to the dress code and exemplary behaviour are all fundamental to achieving academic success and are expected at all times. They confirm a positive attitude and desire for success and are all part of a student's ethos and code of conduct. Our requirements are outlined below and failure to comply with these may lead to temporary or permanent exclusion, ultimately jeopardising a student's place in our Sixth Form.

ILRC

• All students must comply with the ILRC rules including working quietly, not using music equipment, not eating or drinking or using mobile phones. Books must be returned to the shelves after use. Failure to comply will result in events being entered or temporary or permanent exclusion.





Sixth Form Code of Conduct

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY EXPECTATIONS

- Students must maintain a minimum of 95% attendance at both school and in lessons throughout their course to be successful. Failure to achieve this will result in parents/ carers being contacted and students being put on attendance report in the first instance and may jeopardise their place in Year 12. This information will also be amongst the criteria considered when applying for Year 13.
- Attendance at all lessons is **compulsory**. If a student is ill, parents/ carers must call the Sixth Form Office on **0208 270 6517 ON THE FIRST DAY OF ABSENCE** giving details of their illness and when they are likely to return. For all subsequent days of absence either a phone call is needed each day **or** a note from parents/ carers on the student's return, clearly stating each day of absence.
- Absences known in advance must be notified to the Sixth Form Office. Appointment cards or other evidence including parent/ carer letters must be provided.
- Holidays will affect attendance and attainment levels and SHOULD NOT be taken during the school term. The school WILL NOT authorise any holiday taken in school term time. Medical and dental appointments must be made outside of school hours. They are not authorised absence.

BEHAVIOUR

- ID Cards must be worn at all times on a lanyard and visible around the neck. Eastbrook is a secure site and access will not be possible without an ID Card.
- The behaviour of Year 12 students is expected to be of an exemplary standard at all times.
- Bringing the name of Eastbrook School or Sixth Form into disrepute outside of school may result in temporary or permanent exclusion.
- Any student suspected of consuming alcohol will be expected to take a breathalyzer test. Students
 who refuse the test will be assumed to be guilty. Consumption of alcohol or dangerous or illegal
 substances either on school premises or prior to coming onto school premises will be dealt with,
 regardless of age, by temporary or permanent exclusion.
- The use of mobile phones is a privilege given to Sixth Formers. However, these may only be used in the Sixth Form Centre and must be **switched off** around the school and in lessons. Any mobile phone seen being used outside of the Sixth Form Centre will be confiscated and forfeited for one week.

TRANSFER TO YEAR 13

At the end of Year 12 students may apply for admission to Year 13; transfer is not automatic. Students' acceptance into Year 13 will be determined by successful Public Examination results in an acceptable number of subjects (normally considered to be at least 2) and a good record of attainment, progress and effort in all lessons.

THE FINAL DECISION ON ANY ISSUE WILL BE MADE BY THE HEAD OF SIXTH FORM. FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH ANY ASPECT OF THE YEAR 12 CONTRACT MAY RESULT IN TEMPORARY OR PERMANENT EXCLUSION FROM SCHOOL OR BEING PLACED ON A LEARNING GATEWAY CONTRACT WHICH MAY LEAD TO PERMANENT REMOVAL FROM THAT SUBJECT.





Careers and Aspirations

Careers Strategy at Eastbrook

We have an unrelenting ambition to improve social mobility for every student, irrespective of the disadvantage they face, recognising that the careers education and support they receive will have a life changing positive impact. Our students are encouraged to develop their sense of self-worth by developing essential work related and life competencies and by playing a positive role in contributing to school life and the wider community.

Eastbrook students will better understand local, regional, national and global labour markets, providing them with an insight to a diverse range of progression routes and higher education courses, as well as vocational routes such as apprenticeships or employment. We provide opportunities for students to develop careers awareness, employability skills and labour market knowledge to support their progression choices. Eastbrook prides itself on providing high quality and comprehensive careers education, which fosters high aspirations and enables our students to become happy, ambitious and successful citizens. Our school's unique demographic and subsequent student need means the quality of careers education information, advice and guidance provision is personalised and meets individual student needs.

We want our students to be:

- Successful learners who enjoy learning, make progress and achieve their full potential.
- Confident individuals who are able to lead safe, healthy and fulfilling lives.
- Responsible citizens who make a positive contribution to society.

Career Interviews

All pupils in sixth form will have independent careers guidance. Additionally, students will receive impartial, unbiased career guidance from a range of education and training providers to inform them about approved technical education qualifications and apprenticeships through a range of experiences such as assemblies, workshops, events or talks.

University/Apprenticeship application support

Around 90% of our students make applications to university. This means that we offer everyone advice and guidance on choices, activities to support applications and personal statement support in accordance with the UCAS process. For most students, this process starts formally in January of Year 12 and 13 until all students have completed successful applications. Some students apply for apprenticeships and these students are supported by ASK Apprenticeships, Teesside University mentors, The Talent Foundry and Eastbrook careers advisers.

<u>Unifrog</u> is a one-stop careers advice station. It is a great tool to access information on colleges, universities, careers and qualifications. Students can keep their profile up to date and get advice on their next steps. They can add activities to their 'locker' to build a portfolio which can support with CV writing, UCAS, Apprenticeship search and job applications. Students' logins will stay in place even once they have left Eastbrook provided that Unifrog, as a company, still exists. We encourage students to use Unifrog at sixth form so that they can start to explore their interests and strengths and build better and better career knowledge. Unifrog includes up-to-date labour and market information which is relevant to our local area.





Enrichment and Personal Development at Sixth Form

Personal Development

Each student has a dedicated member of staff who will be with them throughout their time in the Sixth Form. These tutors offer a programme of regular meetings to develop and support each student. They are also an advocate for their tutees to liaise with the Head of Sixth Form, the Safeguarding team, the school counsellor and other support networks.

At Eastbrook, we aim to provide a broad and varied programme of study that extends and broadens intellectual horizons, develops skills and awareness, builds confidence, and provides specialist knowledge to help students to access university, further study, training or the world of work. We will also support students in looking after their physical, mental and emotional health and well-being; they are all connected and equally important for success in studies and future life.

We are not an exam factory at Eastbrook; exam grades alone seldom facilitate future prosperity, fulfilment or wellbeing. It is our duty to ensure every student at Eastbrook participates fully in a persona development programme that challenges them to think more, give more and commit more to their wider community. Through projects, workshops, talks, events, mentoring, volunteering, fundraising and work experience, students learn to build self- confidence, develop their employability skills and graduate from Eastbrook ready to flourish in the world outside







Enrichment at Sixth Form

Student Ambassadors

Our student ambassadors are in post from November to July each academic year. This means that early on in Year 12 you will be supporting with staff duties around the school at secondary or primary.

- Applications for student ambassadors is in October of Year 12.
- Shortlisted applicants will be interviewed in October, ready to commence duties soon after.

Our sixth form ambassadors help the whole school to do more, students not only gain a wage but also valuable experience along the way. We are always extremely proud to have them help us make Eastbrook School feel like an amazing place.



Attendance and Punctuality


As a school we know the importance that attendance has on a student's achievement and attainment. Research suggests that students whose attendance drops below 90% significantly underachieve when compared with students whose attendance is 95% or above.

Students have an attendance target of 95%

We will work in partnership with parents / carers to ensure that every student can meet their potential. It is crucial therefore that students attend school **each and every day**. Family support in ensuring this happens is greatly appreciated.

Medical and dental appointments should be made **outside of school hours** unless it is a medical / dental emergency. We require evidence of **ALL** medical / dental appointments and students should present these to the school reception.

Families, please note that if your child is absent this should be reported to the school office before **8:30am**.



The school gates are open from 8am for breakfast club and all students are expected to be on site by 8.35am. If you arrive after this, you are late.

If you arrive late to school, without a valid reason from home, you will be sanctioned with an **after school reflection that day**. This will be communicated with families. If you arrive after **9:35am**, you will remain in reception until a family member has been spoken to, to provide us with a reason for your absence. This will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which could lead to Local Authority intervention.

Students are expected to arrive on time for all lessons. Arriving late to lesson means that students miss out on the Connect phase of the lesson, which is integral for promoting memory and retention.

We expect learners to be responsible for their own time keeping and management. If you are not on time, you are late. These habits will help promote positive work and learnings habits through student's time at Eastbrook School and into the wider world.

Students and families experiencing difficulties with attendance matters should contact the school at the earliest opportunity to talk to the Head of Sixth Form

A School of Character

CHARACTER LIES AT THE HEART OF EVERYTHING THAT WE DO

In additional to our academic curriculum, we have a have focus on encouraging students to develop as global and skilled citizens.

We want all students to achieve academically, but also to demonstrate good character habits in all aspects of their personal and professional life.

'We are what we repeatedly do. Excellence, therefore, is not an act, but a habit.'

Pupils should demonstrate good character in all aspects of their life and our pastoral and academic curriculum is built around our **PROUD** habits.

To be **Principled**, all pupils are expected to behave in an honest and moral way. Doing the right things, for the right reasons at the right time.

To demonstrate **Resilience**, we support our pupils to be adaptable in difficult and challenging situations. Be in a formal assessment, an issue in a lesson or a challenging experience in their home life. By building resilience, we develop stronger, well rounded and independent pupils.

By being **Open**, pupils can contribute towards the greater good of the school and of the wider community. Preparing pupils for a life outside and beyond school, and life that has, hopefully, been enhanced and enriched, by their time at Eastbrook.

Understanding means that you practice and develop intellectual curiosity and the pursuit of knowledge, embedding an appetite and desire for lifelong learning. Not just in school and academia, but in fields pupils are passionate about.

And finally, that our pupils are **Disciplined**. They are thoughtful and considerate of the way they act and the way they treat peers and staff, but also take responsibility for their own actions.

The House System

When you join Eastbrook, you will be assigned to one of our four Houses.

Throughout your time with us you will take part in a variety of physical, academic, creative and scholarly activities that will contribute towards the success of your House.

We believe that a House system is essential in developing a sense of belonging, building a sense of community and encouraging ownership and accountability of our actions. All members of the school community, including teaching and support staff, are assigned to a House.







Teaching and Learning

Teaching and Learning

At Eastbrook we focus on a broad, knowledge rich curriculum, that meets the needs of all students. Students study a range of subjects that develop the cultural capital and intellectual skills necessary to succeed in further education, employment and life itself.

Our teachers ensure that students become scholars; developing a healthy appetite for self-improvement, and study, through setting excellent standards for all, and using their experience, along with evidence-based pedagogy, to structure and deliver lessons.

Assessment at Eastbrook

Research suggests that frequent low stakes testing is the most effective way to deliver positive outcomes and minimise the stress around assessment. This is because it ensures that students receive rapid feedback, practice retrieval often (which makes memory) and are never too far away from another opportunity, to make progress on their previous result.

All students sit a Mid and End of Half Term assessment in each six-week period, in each subject. Mid Terms are short multiple-choice tests, which are peer marked and not reported on centrally, they develop student knowledge. End of Half Term assessment are marked by staff and given a % grade which allows students and parents to track a student's progress against their GCSE target grades, on a regular basis. These assessments focus on longer, independent work, for example, essay writing in English, still life drawing in Art, or problem solving in maths.

Knowledge Organisers

We don't do 'homework' at Eastbrook.

However, this doesn't mean you won't have to study! What it does mean is that students and families are not asked weekly to complete a range of new learning or project related tasks, outside of the classroom. Instead, our curriculum is published in the form of a knowledge organiser booklet. Each student receives a booklet at the beginning of the year, which contains key vocabulary, visual aids, curricular summaries and 'self-study' questions, for a given half term.

Your role as a student is to use this booklet to quiz and test yourself both in school and out of it, on the knowledge you have been taught. Teachers will grade your 'self-study' progress termly, by asking questions of you in class.





Rewards and Achievement

As a school we cultivate a climate of recognition, built around our character education and our rewards and achievement systems. We recognise positive behaviour and use this as a tool to model and shape student expectations. Our achievement system is built around the PROUD Habits, which encourages growth mindset, self-reflection and self-development.

PROUD Points are awarded to students who display excellent efforts in lesson or through schoolwork, contributions to the school community and demonstration of excellent character.

PROUD Points and Achievement

PROUD Points are awarded to students for positive conduct and behaviour. We recognise and celebrate Achievement by taking the number of **PROUD** points, minus the number of Behaviour points. These points are accumulated and measured against key milestones which are recognised and celebrated during end of term celebrations.

Rewards

As part of our celebration assemblies, we recognise students who obtain the following thresholds.

150 Proud Points. Bronze Award.250 Proud Points. Silver Award.350 Proud Points. Gold Award.100% Attendance in a Term / Year.

Rewards Trips

There is a reward trip for Year 12 and 13 at the end of every term. These are for students who consistently demonstrate outstanding behaviour, character, conduct, progress, attendance and behaviour. This may include trips to the theatre, cinema, bowling and other cultural capital opportunities.

At the end of the summer term students will be invited to take part in an **Enrichment Week**, offering them a range of opportunities to engage and soak up some of our local and London culture.



Behaviour Expectations

At Eastbrook School we believe that behaviour is an act of character and as such we have the highest possible standards. Our school creates and environment that is friendly, caring and supportive, so students feel safe, happy and where learning can flourish. We expect for students to conduct themselves in a responsible and respectful way, where lessons have a relentless focus of learning. The learning and progress of students should not and will not be affected by distractions.

We believe that students should take responsibility for their own behaviours and their own behaviour choices, and that they will accept any consequences of poor behaviour choices.

Argumentative, challenging or disruptive behaviour will not be tolerated and students will be sanctioned in line with the school behaviour policy. Sanctions include, removal of break / lunchtime, afterschool detentions, internal suspension, formal suspensions, direction off site by the Headteacher, or Permanent Exclusion. After school detentions run daily between 3:10pm and 4:00pm. Communication will be made with parents / carers, if a student has a detention, but the school does not require consent from the parent / carer.

Warn, Move, Remove

The school does not tolerate or accept behaviour that affects the learning of others. We use a three-stage warning system to correct behaviour. The purpose of this system is to encourage self-regulation, de-escalate classroom confrontations, and provide students with time to change their behaviour choices. If a student continues to make poor behaviour choices, despite teacher intervention, they will be sent to Relocation and issued with an after-school detention.

Relocation Room

The Relocation Room is a supervised space for students who have been relocated to self-regulate, reflect and correct any behaviour issues, it may also be used if a student needs to be kept out of circulation. Students remain in the Relocation for as long as is deemed appropriate; however, the school tries to get students back into lessons as soon as it is safe and appropriate to do so.

Standards Room

If a student arrives late to school, or in incorrect uniform, they may be sent to the Standards Room, where communication will be made with home and any issues can be addressed or corrected.

Mobile Phones

Eastbrook School has a no mobile phone policy. Any mobile phones that are seen are confiscated in line with school policy and kept for a period of five days. A parent / carer will be required to come and collect the phone.

Banned Items

If a student is found in possession of a banned item, it may lead to a suspension and permanent exclusion from school. A full list of banned items can be found within the School Behaviour Policy; however, these are generally considered to be any item that could cause harm to oneself or others.



Safeguarding at Eastbrook

Eastbrook School aims to ensure that:

- o Appropriate action is taken in a timely manner to safeguard and promote children's welfare.
- All staff are aware of their statutory responsibilities with respect to safeguarding.
- Staff are properly trained in recognising and reporting safeguarding issues.

Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of the children means:

- Protecting children from maltreatment.
- o Preventing impairment of children's health or development.
- Ensuring that children grow up in circumstances consistent
- with the provision of safe and effective care.
- Taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes.
- Safeguarding and child protection is everyone's responsibility.

The Designated Safeguarding Lead

The **Designated Safeguarding Lead** (DSL) is a member of the Senior Leadership Team. The DSL is the nominated member of staff who oversees all aspects of Safeguarding and Child Protection.

Within the Safeguarding Team there are Deputy Designated Safeguard Leads, who support students, staff, families and the DSL. During term time, the DSL and DDSLs will be available during school hours for staff to discuss any safeguarding concerns.

If the DSLs and DDSLs are not available, Jamie Gibson, Headteacher of Secondary, will be available to support.

The Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy

Full details regarding the school's procedures for dealing Safeguarding concerns can be found within the Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy.

This includes details regarding concerns of FGM, Extremism, Sexting, Peer on Peer Abuse, County Lines and Pupils at Risk of Criminal Exploitation.
