Chronology is putting events in time order; starting with the furthest back in time. To do this you need to understand some key terms.

Word	Definition
AD	A period of one hundred years
BC	A time period before Christ was born
BCE	A time period that is the same as AD but is not linked to Christianity
Century	In Britain time is measured by the Christian calendar and so we say any year after the year of Jesus's birth is 'In the year of our Lord'. In Latin this translates as Anno Domini
Chronology	A period of ten years
Decade	A period of one thousand years
Millennium	Putting events in order of time
Common Era	A time period before the Common Era

- Julius Cesar, a Roman, invaded England 55 BC
- World War 1 broke out 1914 AD
- William of Normandy won the Battle of Hastings 1066
